find that even ONE word can be a member of several different Parts of Speech depending on how it is used in a sentence. As you read this book, you may find words listed as one form of speech and it also may be listed as another Part of Speech too.

This IS NOT an error. I could not give all of the possible definitions for every word or this book would be hundreds of pages long.

You've got a Proper Name and if you are a Christian, you also carry the name of Christ. The question is: How will you carry BOTH of those names throughout your lifetime? A <u>Pronoun</u> is a word that takes the place of a Noun. Without Pronouns, our writing would be very repetitive and boring, because we would need to repeat the person's name over and over again.

For Example: "<u>Cindy</u> liked to play basketball. <u>Cindy</u> could really dribble the ball. Cindy could shoot and get a basket from mid-court."

Imagine just how repetitive it would be if it were a whole paragraph or story! BORING! When personal pronouns are used instead, it sounds less repetitive. "Cindy liked to play basketball and <u>she</u> could really dribble the ball. She could also shoot from mid-court and still score."



The <u>Subject</u> Pronoun is <u>DOING</u> the action.

The <u>Object</u> Pronoun is <u>RECEIVING</u> the action.

Possessive Pronouns express WHO OWNS possession.

Reflexive Pronouns refer back to who the subject is. For example: "Oh, <u>I</u> burned <u>myself</u>!"

When people write, it can be from the 1st person position or perspective. In other words, the person is writing about his/herself or from his/her perspective or opinion.

OR

A group of people can also write about themselves from a 1st person plural position as a GROUP. If people are working together for one cause, this is how they would write on a website – from the 1st person plural position.

A writer can also write from the perspective of 2nd person. In REAL LIFE, in the Bible, the Apostle Paul speaks right to the people, they are characters in the story called LIFE! He is giving a sermon and sermons are GOOD examples of 2nd person writing. For example:

1 Corinthians 1:26 - 31

^{"26} Brothers and sisters, think of what <u>you</u> were when you were called. Not many of <u>you</u> were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. ²⁷ But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. ²⁸ God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are, ²⁹ so that no one may boast before him. ³⁰ It is because of him that you are in Christ Jesus, who has become for us wisdom from God—that is, our righteousness, holiness and redemption. ³¹ Therefore, as it is written: "Let the one who boasts boast in the Lord."[d]" (NIV)

There ARE other forms of Non-fiction 2nd person writing though, for example, writing that is meant to be a script for a video or an article that gives directions to make something, for example, a recipe. The writer would have to directly address the reader as "you." For Example: "You beat 2 eggs slightly and then add them to the dry ingredients..." Second person writing is also used in advertising, when companies try to get you to buy their product. This is advertising that uses the words "you" or "your."

In fictional writing, 2nd person writing means you as the author, are speaking right to the reader, as though they were a part of the story. The writer addresses the reader as if he/she is actually one of the people involved in the action.

The 3rd person perspective or point of view, is when the writer serves as the narrator, describing the actions of the characters and events in the story. This is story telling.

Reciprocal Pronouns mean that 2 people or animals are carrying out some activity between the 2 individuals/animals involved. Examples of Reciprocal Pronouns are:

each other & one another

The word "demonstrate" means to show someone or to point out a particular item. Demonstrative Pronouns are used to show or point out a particular subject matter. Examples are: this these (Plural)

that those (Plural)

Distributive Pronouns refer to individual people or things rather than a group. Examples are:

each, either, neither

Relative Pronouns establish a <u>relationship</u> between the subject and the action taking place. Examples are:

that	whichever
what	who
whatever	whoever
when	whom
which	whomever
