Using MORE Root or Base

ADDING ED.

Used with ALL Pronouns I,
you, he, she, it, we, and
they, OR their equivalent.

I chopped...

You bussed...

He chatted...

She drummed...

It gripped...

We hugged...

They hopped...

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SIMPLE PAST - EXAMPLE 1

PAST REGULARLY SCHEDULED COMPLETED EVENTS

I chopped onions daily in my job as a cook.

You bussed your children to school daily. Note: it can also be spelled "bused"


He chatted with customers daily in his job as a customer service representative.

She drummed out a cadence weekly at her regular music lessons.

The dog gripped the bone and wouldn't let go during our regular play activities.

We hugged each other at the airport as my husband and I always did when he returned from his weekly trip to New York.

They hopped in their enclosure daily as only kangaroos can do.

I knitted...

You napped...

He pulled...

It buzzed...

We tipped...

They patted...

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SIMPLE PAST - EXAMPLE 2

PAST - BACK TO ONE POINT IN TIME

I once knitted a purse with yarn.

You napped that Saturday until 2:00 p.m.



He pulled with his back legs and won the tug of war for the whole team.

Months ago, she rubbed that table with tung oil and it became a beauty.

The bee buzzed a warning, but we did not heed it, and got stung yesterday.

One day, we tipped a huge rock over and discovered a whole colony of ants.

They patted the bat boy on the back for saving someone's life that day.

You have lugged...

We have dipped...


They have equipped...

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PRESENT PERFECT

PRESENT - 1 OR MORE EVENTS IN THE PAST THAT ARE PERTINENT TO THE PRESENT AND MAY/MAY NOT BE AFFECTING EVENTS HAPPENING IN THE PRESENT



I have tripped over that rug numerous times and it's time to get a new one.

You have lugged rocks for the patio for days and it's time to rest.

He has scrubbed that basement floor many times trying to improve it, but it's so chipped up it needs to be repainted.

She has cancelled her appointment 3 times and finally kept her appointment today.

The dog has hopped the fence 5 times now and we are going to have to walk it on a leash.

We have dipped into our savings account so many times we have almost nothing, so we are going to be conscientious about saving now.

They have equipped their people and now they are prepared for the Lord Jesus Christ's use.

I had jogged...

You had flipped...

He had excelled...

She had butted...

It had begged...

We had plotted...

They had ripped...

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PAST PERFECT

PAST - A SENTENCE MAKING A COMPARISON BETWEEN HOW 2 OR MORE SEQUENTIAL EVENTS OCCUR IN A PAST TIME FRAME.

I had jogged 5 miles and then sat down exhausted and thirsty.

You had flipped the car over trying to avoid an oncoming car and then wound up in the hospital.


He had excelled in college and later got an excellent job.

She had butted heads with the boss so many times he finally fired her.

The dog had begged for food repeatedly, so we decided to rescue it.

We had plotted a course for New England, but the threat of hurricanes cancelled it. (Note: "canceled" is also correct.)

They had ripped the main sail in the winds and had to stop in a port to repair it.

You will have tanned...

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FUTURE PERFECT

FUTURE - A SENTENCE MAKING A COMPARISON BETWEEN HOW 2 OR MORE SEQUENTIAL EVENTS OCCUR IN A FUTURE TIME FRAME.

On Tuesday, I will have submitted my application before the Memorial Day holiday.
Due to my delayed arrival, you will have tanned in Florida before I even get to the beach.
Don't worry, he will have trapped some crabs before supper time tonight.
This afternoon, she will have whipped up the cake and icing before the party this evening.
It will have deferred payments long enough for her to get a job.

This weekend, we will have fitted her gown before the date of the rehearsal.

This afternoon, they will have jogged 13 miles before they get to the bridge.
