

2 PAST PERFECT Using the Root or Base word form and ADDING ED TO IT - <u>PLUS</u> THE HELPING VERB - <u>"had</u> "	PAST PERFECT PAST - A SENTENCE MAKING A COMPARISON BETWEEN HOW 2 OR MORE SEQUENTIAL EVENTS OCCUR IN A PAST TIME FRAME.
AND THE USE OF ADVERBS LIKE: "before, "after," "later," "then," and/or CONJUNCTIONS LIKE "but"	<u>I had packed</u> the entire car and then needed the tire jack.
to indicate sequence. Used with <u>ALL</u> Pronouns I, you,	<u>You had munched</u> on snacks before we had dinner.
he, she, it, we, and they, OR their equivalent.	He had missed the ball twice and then got a home run.
I had packed You had munched	She had leashed the dog for a walk before it started to rain.
He had missed	It had jumped up on the lady before I could control it.
She had leashed It had jumped	We had fostered the little boy and then decided to adopt him.
