God Presents: Words with the Letter Rr that DO NOT Control the Vowels in Them


When DOESN'T an R Control a vowel?
Let's find out with the word "arose," meaning past tense of "arise." When I say, "past past tense of "arise. When I say, past something that has already happened. Using the word in a sentence we could say, "The sun arose at 6:30 this morning.

So, in that word "arose
controlled by the Rr?

Here is where syllabication comes into play. To count the syllables in a word, just put your hand under your chin and say the word slowly. As you go, count the number of times your chin hits your hand.
The count that you get tells you how many syllables there are in the word.

Let's say the word "arose" and see. Hold your hand under your chin and say the word "arose" meaning past tense of "arise."
"a-rose" - The word "arose" has 2
syllables. The "A" makes the sound "uh" and is operating totally on its own in a separate syllable - "a-rose." In that word the letter R IS NOT controlling the vowel sound.
